AGM Meeting Procedures

Meeting Protocol:

- The SAMRT Annual General Meeting (AGM) uses Roberts Rules of Order. The rules of order help us to get through the business in an organized manner.
- The AGM is an opportunity for members to participate in discussions with the Council and other members in attendance and to have this exchange of information recorded and made accessible to the membership at large (through the minutes). Any SAMRT member can make a motion or second it; making a motion just allows us to discuss an item.
- The Chair directs the conversation; they are assisted during the virtual AGM by an appointed Moderator. For the virtual AGM, any member who wishes to ask a question uses the question field in the virtual platform. The question field is monitored by a Moderator who will read the questions aloud.
- The Parliamentarian is here to help - for example, if you wanted to propose a motion but don't know how to word it. They also make sure the Chair runs the business fairly.

Motions

Practicing and Non-practicing members have a voice (can make motions and debate) and can vote. Students and Life-Members can vote; however, they do not have a voice.

Every Motion Has 6 Steps:

1. **Motion:** When a member must type the motion into the question field, beginning by stating their last name; the Moderator then reads it aloud.
2. **Second:** Another member seconds the motion.
3. **Restate motion:** The chairperson restates the motion and then the debate can begin.
4. **Debate:** Using the question field, members debate by typing their full name and comments into the question window, and the Moderator will read the message aloud.
 - 4.1. All comments and questions must be relevant to the motion. Avoid repetition.
 - 4.2. No member may speak twice in support of or in opposition to a question on the floor.
 - 4.3. The Chair may request a member provide further explanation of the matter.
 - 4.4. The member may then respond with clarification but may not make further comment.
 - 4.5. The mover of the motion can, at the conclusion of debate, be allowed a reply.
5. **Vote:** The chairperson restates the motion, and then asks for a vote.
 - 5.1. Reminder, only SAMRT members can vote.
 - 5.2. Members attending the meeting virtually will vote on motions using a polling function.
 - 5.3. If members are attending the meeting virtually in a group setting, there will be only 1 vote permitted per registration. If a member wishes to cast their own vote, they must register, login, and engage with the meeting independently.
 - 5.4. Only votes "for" and votes "against" are counted. Once a decision is reached, the same question cannot be considered again during the same meeting.
6. **Announce the vote:** The chairperson announces the result of the vote and any instructions.

Amendments

1. An amendment can alter a motion but cannot negate the intent.
2. Amendments must be relevant to the original motion.
3. Amendments must not introduce a new item of business.
4. The order of voting on a motion that is amended is:
 - the amendment to the first amendment;
 - the first amendment (possibly as amended); and
 - the original motion (possibly as amended).
5. Each member can speak separately to each amendment and to each amended amendment or amended motion.

Motion to Defer

1. If the membership has difficulty with a motion on the floor and wants time to think about it and perhaps discuss it, a decision can be deferred. A motion to defer postpones further debate until a specified time.
2. A motion to defer (postpone) is eligible for debate if the discussion is confined to the postponement action only. The original question being deferred is not to be discussed while the motion to defer is before the meeting.
3. If the membership agrees to postpone the question, the debate ceases until the time specified in the motion to postpone. The debate is then resumed where it left off.

Non-Debatable Motions

Robert's rules permit debate on almost every motion that reaches the floor through proper procedure. Some exceptions which are all non-amendable and not debatable are:

1. motion to adjourn debate on a particular question;
2. motion to adjourn the meeting; and
3. motion to challenge the ruling of the Chair.

The SAMRT Constitution governs what occurs during our general membership meetings. The *Rules of Order* are not those of the President, the Council, the Parliamentarian, or any other individual or sub-group. *Robert's Rules of Order* arise out of that constitution and are designed to assist and protect your individual rights during our general membership meetings. Each member has a right to freely express any relevant opinion to the Association. These rules must not appear to be a threat to anyone. They are there to be used to promote members' ideas and are not solely for the Chair's benefit.

Special Rules of Order for AGM's

(Appendix C SAMRT Administrative Bylaws)

Parliamentary Authority

The most recent edition of *Robert's Rules of Order* shall govern the organization in all procedural matters not otherwise covered by *The SAMRT Administrative Bylaws, 2015*.

Scrutineers

Scrutineers will be appointed by the executive director prior to the annual or special meeting.

Parliamentarian

A designated parliamentarian will be at all annual or special meetings.

Meetings will be conducted in an orderly, effective process, led, and defined by the chair.

1. All bylaw obligations respecting annual general meetings must be satisfied.
2. SAMRT members entitled to hold a voice and vote at the SAMRT annual general meeting include those holding full Practicing membership or non-practicing membership. SAMRT members entitled to vote at all annual general meetings include those holding student membership, or life membership.
3. Annual general meetings shall be called to order at the time specified in the notice of meeting and upon satisfaction of quorum. A quorum for any annual meeting shall be the members present, entitled to vote.
4. Meeting order and decorum shall be maintained, and all members treated with dignity, respect, courtesy, and fairness during discussion and debate and in all other respects.
5. SAMRT members must keep their comments relevant to the issue under consideration.
6. Annual general meetings will be conducted at a level of informality considered appropriate by the chair, including that discussion of a matter may occur prior to a proposal that action be taken on any given subject.
7. A motion from the floor must be offered by an SAMRT member. It shall be submitted directly to the secretary of the meeting and must be signed by the mover and seconder. A motion will be made, discussed, and then voted on. Note: for the virtual AGM, a motion will be submitted through the question field and will be directed to the appointed Moderator.

8. After a motion has been duly moved and seconded, the mover will be recognized as the first speaker and will be permitted to speak a second time in the closing debate of the subject.
9. A member may speak only once to any one motion for a maximum of three minutes unless special permission is granted by the chair.
10. The chair of the annual general meeting may not to the same extent as any SAMRT member, make motions or engage in debate.
 - 10.1 If the chair wishes to engage in debate, they may step down temporarily to engage in discussion. At such a time, the parliamentarian shall take over as chair.
11. In the case of a tied vote, the motion will be defeated.
12. A motion to amend a main motion may be amended but third level amendments are out of order.

Alliance 2021 Annual Activity Summary

The **Alliance of Medical Radiation and Imaging Technologists Regulators of Canada (AMRITRC)**, or the **Alliance**, is a group of provincial regulators who address issues related to the evolution of medical radiation and imaging technologist regulation with the goal of enhancing safe, competent, and ethical care for Canadians. The Alliance brings together organizations that have the legislative authority of a Canadian province or territory for regulating practice of medical radiation and imaging technologists. It was formed to ensure public protection by advancing MRIT regulation, professional standards, patient care, and regulatory issues. Eight years following incorporation, the Alliance continues to work to achieve the following goals:

- Encouraging and supporting communication and information sharing
- Developing, promoting, and evaluating common standards
- Facilitating MRIT mobility between regulated jurisdictions
- Encouraging and promoting standardised regulatory policies and procedures
- Supporting provincial MRIT organizations in their pursuit of MRIT regulation

Alliance members are regulatory bodies, responsible for ensuring safe, quality, professional, ethical, and competent imaging, and radiation therapy services in their respective jurisdictions, helping to ensure that MRITs practice in accordance with defined practice, competence, conduct, ethical and professional standards.



Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Alliance held no in person meetings for the second year in a row with the Board of Directors continuing to focus on priority issues during 2021, meeting by Zoom. While it is recognized that there are cost benefits to virtual meetings, there is great anticipation building for in person meetings in 2022.

HIGHLIGHTS

Effective November 18, 2021, the Alliance welcomed the College of Allied Health Professionals of Prince Edward Island (CAHPPEI) — the new regulator of MRTs, medical laboratory technologists, and respiratory therapists in PEI — as an organizational member. CAHPPEI's Registrar Bernard Plourde now serves on the Alliance Board of Directors. The Alliance was also advised that Tyler Ferrish, who had been a regular observer at Alliance meetings for PEI's MRTs, has been appointed to the Initial Council of CAHPPEI for a two-year term, ending April 20, 2023.

The Alliance also welcomed new Manitoba Association of MRTs Executive Director Pamela McFarlane as an observer at Alliance meetings as MAMRT continues to pursue MRT regulation. We thank Salín Guttormsson for her time in that role, which she left in September 2021.

RECURRING ACTIVITIES

For the second year of the global pandemic, the Alliance focused on information-sharing during 2021, with these recurring agenda items:

- Canadian Comparison Chart of Regulators and Associations for MRITs — updated annually, published on Alliance website
- Canadian Free Trade Agreement (CFTA) Certificate — supports labour mobility and registration practices for individual regulatory bodies
- Canadian Network of Agencies for Regulation (CNAR) — Julie Avery continues to serve as the Alliance's representative
- Focus on governance — annual review of Governance Summary and Handbook, along with (Re)Orientation for Alliance Directors
- Cross-Country Information-Sharing — Board meetings and monthly virtual chats provide opportunities for members and guests from not-yet-regulated jurisdictions to provide updates on MRIT regulation, e.g., the inclusion of diagnostic medical sonographers (DMS), internationally educated MRITs, and updates on governance modernization efforts

The Alliance continues to be a member of the National Network, a coalition of organizations with a shared interest in the profession of medical radiation and imaging technology in Canada. The National Network includes provincial regulators and associations, and nationally, CAMRT, Sonography Canada, and the Alliance.

Program Advisory Committee (PAC)

Medical Diagnostics Imaging Programs

I was unable to attend the PAC meeting due to staffing issues, but I have included some of the meeting minutes as information:

Program Report

All programs have moved back to zoom invigilated closed book exams with lockdown browser for theory courses, which helps students better assess their knowledge and overall understanding. Programs are continually working with indigenous advisors to ensure ongoing support for our students which has been beneficial for student success.

Two large projects are underway, Medical Radiologic Technology (MRT) Accreditation process and Academic Planning to align program delivery with Sask Polytech Strategic Plan. Accreditation site visit will be in September 2022. Curriculum is updated as part of the academic planning. Film is being removed and may be an option as a continuing education course for CLXTs. A new Computed Topography (CT) course is being added with procedures and correlation to meet the competency profile for the Canadian Association of Medical Radiologic Technologists (CAMRT).

Academic Chair Report

A new full time MRT faculty position was created, and additional faculty were hired to assist with program requirements and CLXT expansion. Five casual faculty were hired to help with unplanned leave of absences and assist with on-campus labs and clinical.

Preceptor Workshops were rolled out in the Saskatoon area. RUH mini workshops were developed and implemented. Positive feedback was received from technologists, clinical faculty, and students. Supervisor at RUH found students are coming more prepared and are collaborating with their techs. Long term goal is to have the mentorship program scheduled at the beginning of clinical to help everyone feel more comfortable and facilitate positive interactions between the preceptors and students.

Goal to Focus on

Reduce reliance on clinical partners by increasing simulation on campus for both CLXT and MRT programs. Additional funding is required for accessing websites and purchasing Virtual Reality (VR) equipment to allow the facilitation of the simulation. The increased use of simulation would provide more experience for students prior to going to a clinical environment. Virtual technology currently being explored is for pre-clinical, however, the program plans to look at future options to utilize simulation for difficult to achieve competencies or support for students that are experiencing difficulty. To meet academic planning criteria the total number of hours in clinical will need to be reduced and alternative delivery models will need to be explored.

Entry Level MRT

Stakeholders indicated that Sask Polytech training is mostly meeting the needs of the entry level MRTs. The only comment is the requirement to have more graduates. A growing expansion of the MRT role combined with retirements is expected to create a further gap in the future. Stresses to SHA staffing and resources include the increase of private community providers that pull from the same pool of employees. Specialty positions such as Medical Radiologic Imaging (MRI) and CT and general MRT have been impacted. The urgent care centres in Saskatoon and Regina and upcoming expansion of Prince Albert hospital will pull additional MRTs. With the Regina clinic expected to open March 2023 some significant gaps are expected.

Sask Polytech clarified that to expand the number of seats in the MRT program additional funding from Advance Education would be required. Expansion initiatives are not directed by the program or Sask Polytech, all requests for expansion are to be driven by industry.

Participant Round Table Presentation

The program is going through academic planning and asked for feedback that may be pertinent to an entry level MRT. Some new requirements with the Sask Polytech strategic plan that will be implemented include a three-credit indigenous cross-cultural course. An introductory wellness piece which was identified as a need by the Canadian Association of Medical Radiation Technologists (CAMRT) due to Covid to be a functioning member of a health care team. MRI is not on the radar at this moment but if it is identified by industry as a need, it should be moved forward at Program Advisory and to ministry tables. SAMRT identified that there are roughly 54 MRI technologists in the province at any given time. Sonography if identified as a provincial need would need to be addressed through leadership and ministry to be investigated further.

Ministry asked the SHA to provide additional information and data to support the need for more Medical Radiologic Technologists in the province. Work Force Planning in collaboration with the SHA can work together to build a business case that can be put forward. MRI tech needs should also be addressed in advance so a pre-study can be done to determine any increased demands for the service and equipment needs over the next 10 years.

The biggest flag or stress point identified is recruitment and retention of MRTs and MRI techs. A snapshot nationally would see that multiple provinces are experiencing shortages and our province has reached a level that is impacting hours of operation. The SHA is starting to see a reduction of services where traditional after hour on-site coverage has moved to an on-call model which has not been seen in the past 25 years. A lot of the challenges seen are due to the pandemic and techs going to private clinics. Many recruitment and retention strategies and return for service initiatives have not generated applicants. A provincial strategy needs to be in place and an in-province educational solution for MRI should be investigated understanding that it is not a quick solution and multi-level discussions will be required. The SHA has money to spend on recruitment but are not able to get the people required to fill the positions.

Sonography remains an ongoing issue and notes that previous discussions were occurring to bring a sonography program to Saskatchewan and want to make sure it remains on the radar. Staffing remains a struggle in Regina and throughout Saskatchewan including lack of Echo Techs.

Program reported that Sask Polytech has a process for Internationally Educated MLTs to refresh training and knowledge before they can be licensed in Saskatchewan by the MLT governing body. Question was raised whether a similar process is available for MRT. Sask Polytech has received a few inquiries and is currently investigated options. SAMRT representation would like to see an avenue for internationally trained MRTs to gain the knowledge required to remain in the province. SAMRT did participate in a pilot program for internationally educated health professionals (IEHP) through the Ministry of Foreign Qualification Recognition, Career Services and Sask Polytech in fall 2021- spring 2022. The pilot was funded by the Federal government and was not renewed for a further term.

Key messages recap

Long term goal of Preceptors acting as mentors to MRT clinical students will positively impact MRT clinical training experience in Saskatoon.

Creative staffing models are being considered to staff the north and low volume sites in the south. Proposing the creation of a continuing education course for radiation safety for employed CLXT and MRTs.

A significant MRT shortage was discussed, and identification that the province is currently in the middle of an MRI tech and Sonographer shortage. SHA will work with Advance Education and Work Force Planning on any proposals required to move the issues forward.

Radiation Health and Safety Committee Report 2021

The Radiation Health and Safety Committee is outlined in the Saskatchewan Employment Act and shall:

- Advise the minister with respect to radiation health generally, safety measures and recommend codes of practice concerning radiation health, safety and operation of radiation equipment and the use of radioactive substances.
- Promote an educational program among owners, operators, radiation workers and others who may be exposed to radiation dangers and protection.
- Provide general direction and advice to radiation health officers.
- Make recommendations regarding the acquisition, operation and use of radiation equipment and associated apparatus and use of radioactive substances.
- Advise the minister regarding the minimum age a person may be employed as a radiation worker in any occupation or category.
- Advise the minister regarding conditions to protect the reproductive health in any category of conditions under which persons of reproductive ages may be radiation workers.
- Consult on other matters relating to radiation health that the minister may refer to it.

The committee is comprised of:

- A diagnostic radiologist
- A radiation oncologist
- A duly qualified medical practitioner with extensive knowledge of and training in haematology
- A dentist or dental surgeon
- A SAMRT medical radiation technologist
- A veterinarian
- A physicist experienced in radiation physics
- A person with expertise in uranium radiation protection issues
- One or more persons selected by the minister
- Employee of the ministry responsible for supervising the provision of services mentioned in section 5-20 of the Saskatchewan Employment Act
- A radiation health officer

The Radiation Health and Safety Committee generally meet twice a year. In February, the SAMRT member provided an update to the committee on the progress of the Regulation of Sonographers in Saskatchewan and reported on the status of the SAMRT AGM to be held virtually in the fall.

In July, the committee reviewed the discussion paper to be sent out to stakeholders regarding the regulations. Discussion papers have been shared and the feedback received will be compiled and reviewed at the next meeting.

Clinical Excellence Award

This award acknowledges an individual who provides exemplary direct care to patients in medical radiation technology. They provide respectful, efficient, effective, safe, and ethical care, participates in the development of new knowledge or research, and promotes the profession by example of clinical excellence to others.

Mentorship Award

This award acknowledges an individual who directly participates in activities that promote education and development of medical radiological technology students, colleagues, and other health professionals. They also promote the profession by being an excellent mentor to others.
